On 22 January 2021, the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons comes into force, marking a historic turning point in the effort to eliminate nuclear weapons.

On 24 October 2020, Honduras became the 50th country to ratify the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, meaning the treaty will come into effect for all other countries who have ratified it.

The treaty is the first global agreement to comprehensively prohibit nuclear weapons and makes illegal their use, development, production, testing, and stockpiling in all countries who have ratified the treaty.

The first nuclear bomb used in wartime was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan by the United States of America on 6 August 1945.

Three days later, a second bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, Japan in what was the last time nuclear weapons were used in war.



3. Approximately how many nuclear weapons are there in the world?

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There are approximately 14,000 nuclear weapons in the world, thousands of which are ready to be launched in an instant. The power of many of those warheads is tens of times greater than the weapons dropped on the Japanese cities of Nagasaki and Hiroshima 75 years ago.

Of these, approximately 9,500 are in military service and the rest are awaiting dismantlement.

In 1987, at the peak of nuclear weapons development, there were approximately 70,000 nuclear weapons in the world.

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In October 1961, Russia tested the world's most powerful nuclear weapon, the Tsar Bomba.


It was approximately 1,500 times stronger than the bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki combined.

The blast waves orbited the earth three times, and the flash from the bomb could be seen 1,000 km away.




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Britain conducted 12 nuclear tests in Australia between 1952 and 1957. Up until 1963, hundreds of bomb development trials using toxic and radioactive materials were also conducted.

Tests were conducted at the Montebello Islands in Western Australia, and at Emu Field and Maralinga in South Australia.

The tests caused significant harm to the health of the local Aboriginal peoples, many of whom were not evacuated prior to the testing.

Only three weeks later, the United States of America would drop two bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in Japan.

An additional 35 countries have signed the treaty but have not yet ratified it.

Australia has not signed or ratified the treaty.
