

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Suitcase Instructions Unpack the Facts – Young Humanitarian Challenge



Materials

You will need:

- Suitcase template
- Travel badges
- Glue
- Scissors
- Textas or pencils

Instructions


Step 1: Making the inside





- To make the inside of the box, cut out the main shape.
- <u>Cut</u> all **solid** lines (don't cut the dashed lines).
- <u>Fold</u> the paper along all **dashed** lines towards the inside of the paper, as shown in the picture.
- Glue the side flaps down inside.

Step 2: Making the outside



- Cut out the second shape and fold the paper along the dashed lines, bending it inwards.
- Glue one end flap to the other, so that you create a sleeve.
- Once you have made both parts, you can slide the drawer into the sleeve.

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Step 3: Adding the strap



- Now cut the strip for the suitcase handle.
- Fold along the dashed lines and glue down the ends on either side of the dashed lines, with the space in between curved up, like a handle.

Step 4: Decorating it



- Using textas or pencils you can draw extra details on the suitcase. You could colour the corners of the suitcase or add straps down the side.
- Now decorate the sides of the suitcase by gluing some travel badges.

Finished! Now put your cut-out questions inside, and get ready to quiz your family and friends.

ANSWER	Currently, Turkey hosts most of the world's refugees.	ANSWER	No! It is a basic human right to seek protection.
ANSWER	Poorer countries Turkey: 3.6 million Islamic Rep. Iran: 3.4 million Colombia: 2.5 million.	ANSWER	Yes! Asylum seekers have a right to enter our country to seek asylum regardless of how they arrive or whether they hold valid travel or identity documents.
ANSWER	Leaving family behind, new culture, language barrier, finding work. Can you think of some more?	ANSWER	We all have the right to education, to be treated fairly, to seek asylum to another country - and lots more!
ANSWER	Almost half are children! (41%).		 * to treat someone badly especially because of their race, religion or political beliefs. * to constantly target and bully someone, not respecting their basic human rights. * to put someone in danger.
ANSWER	Find out more information. Be friendly to the new child at school. Smile - smiling is a universal language. Share what you have learned with others.	ANSWER	A refugee is a person who has claimed asylum and been granted a protection visa.

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Terminology Sheet - Unpack The Facts - Young Humanitarian Challenge

Word	Meaning			
Asylum	Safety			
Asylum Seeker	A person who is asking for protection (safety) to be granted to them.			
Convention	International conventions are treaties or agreements between states to follow a set of rules.			
Displacement	Forced movement of people from their home.			
Human Rights	Rights that belong to every single person.			
Persecution	Continuous bad-treatment or harassment. Persecution is the severe abuse and denial of the human rights of individuals or groups.			
Protection	Allowing an asylum seeker to remain in a country as a refugee and be protected from the danger that they were fleeing.			
Refugee	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape persecution and has been granted protection in a different country.			
Refoulement	Forced return of refugees or asylum seekers to a country where they are likely to be persecuted or put in danger.			
Refugee Convention	Defines who can be a refugee. It sets out the rights of people who are granted asylum and the responsibilities of governments to protect them.			
Signatories	A country that has signed an agreement / treaty / convention.			
Stateless	A person not recognised as a citizen of any country.			
Trauma	The long-lasting psychological impacts of a bad event.			
United Nations (UN)	An international organisation founded in 1945 after World War 2 by 51 countries committed to maintaining international peace and security, developing friendly relations among countries and promoting social progress, better living standards and human rights.			
United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)	Created in 1950 after World War 2 to help millions of Europeans who had fled or lost their homes.			
Visa	An authorisation on a passport showing that the holder is allowed to enter, leave, or stay for a specified period of time in a country.
