

Our respect is also extended to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who are present here with us today.




Northern Territory Program Locations









Tiwi Islands - Wurrumiyanga

• Overview: The Family Support Services (FSS) and Wangatunga Strong Women (WSW) work and deliver from the Red Cross office, known as the Ngaripuwananjirri Centre (the Centre), Wurrumiyanga, Bathurst Island, Tiwi Islands. The Centre's vision is to culturally nurture Tiwi kakirijuwi (children) and ngirimipi (families) in homes, in community and on country Tiwi Way, through our core values of Respect for Elders, Cultural Empowerment and Fostering Resilient & Connected Families. At the heart of the Centre are the Wangatunga Strong Women, esteemed as the Elders, leaders, mentors, and valued cultural advisors/facilitators. Ngaripuwanajirri serves as a dedicated safe cultural community space where we actively foster and promote intergenerational knowledge sharing. The Tiwi's Centre Statement is Naki awungarra pulanjinga ngawa pwakumwara -We Stay Safe in this Place.



Wangatunga Strong Women: The DCF funding KPI's include working towards supporting the WSW Association in becoming an independent compliant association, for the purpose of transferring the FSS project to the WSW Association. Some of the highlights for this year have included the design and printing of the WSW Logo, increase in interest in participating as Cultural Facilitators for programs, regular formal Association meetings with an attendance rate of an average of 20 ongoing committed WSW members, with a recent meeting being voluntarily chaired by two members, and an increase in emerging leaders joining the group. Other key milestones and highlights coming from the most recent Association meeting, is the nomination of 8 new directors, and the agreement to transfer the existing Association to the *Corporations* (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006 (CATSI Act) - the Office of the Register of Indigenous Corporations. The Association continues to be supported on a pro-bono basis from Clayton Utz Lawyers.



Communities for Children Palmerston & Tiwi

- Communities for Children is an initiative funded in full by the Department of Social Services over 5 years (ending 2026) Australian Red Cross as the Facilitating Partner is currently working alongside 2 place-based committees and 6 Community Partners to deliver 14 weekly programs across Palmerston and the Tiwi Islands, supporting 80+ individual clients (children/ young people) and their families each week.
- The aim is to facilitate a whole of community approach to support early childhood development and wellbeing with a focus on children from birth to 12 years (up to 18 years) and their families, this intervention approach aims to support families to improve their relationships with each other, improving parenting skills and capacity and ensuring the health and wellbeing of children and young people.

CfC Programs - Tiwi & Palmerston

- Play2Learn (PIV, Driver, Farrar & Moulden) Supported Playgroup for Children aged 0-5 and their caregivers fostering children's psychosocial development, facilitating school readiness and improving family connections and wellbeing.
- **CALD Playgroup** (Driver) Culturally and Linguistically Diverse playgroup focuses on families who speak languages other than English and/ or belong to a minority culture, encouraging social connection, parenting capacity, share experiences and stories and be linked to other relevant service providers.
- Frangipani Friends (Driver) Frangipani Friends welcomes families experiencing post natal depression, anxiety and psychosis and focuses on developing healthy attachments between caregivers and children, learning about and linking clients to further support services, encouraging social connections between individuals with lived experience of PND.
- Aunties Place (Palmerston) This program seeks to address a young persons' needs holistically by engaging them in meaningful employment to build skills, knowledge and confidence, by engaging them in activities to build on and maintain their connection to their culture, Country and identity and through engagement with positive, pro-social meaningful mentoring relationships. The goal, will be a group of young people who are strong and grounded in their cultural identity, confident about making good decisions for themselves and their community, and who are engaged in meaningful employment as a key pathway out of disadvantage & will become strong leaders & role models for their community
- DRUMBEAT (Wurrumiyanga, Milikapiti, Pirlangimpi, Paru) Trauma informed therapeutic Music program delivered from primary and secondary schools aimed at supporting children and young people who do not respond to talk based therapy. Focusing on values, emotional wellbeing, teamwork and identity.
- Holding Children Together (Wurrumiyanga) 1-1 School based therapeutic counselling service for children aged 5-12 years of age who have experienced interpersonal trauma
- **Kids Connect (Moulden, Driver)** School based program supporting children and young people experiencing behavioural difficulties, low self esteem and/ or poor school attendance.
- BabyFAST (Wurrumiyanga) Early intervention and prevention program that helps children succeed by empowering parents, connecting families, improving the school climate and strengthening community engagement.

Preparedness

Exercise Terrasite:

- In November, Exercise Terrasite was conducted at three sites—Darwin, Katherine, and Alice Springs.
- It involved 27 staff and volunteers, providing valuable experience for many new participants who integrated into the IMT, working both remotely and in the EOC.

Evacuation Centre walk through:

- As part of our annual pre-season preparedness, familiarisation visits were held at preferred sites in Darwin, Katherine, and Alice Springs.
- This year, we also inspected potential sites in Nhulunbuy.
- The annual walkthroughs involved Territory Families, Housing and Communities (TFHC), our partner agency, along with the Welfare Group, new volunteers, staff, and other functional groups.

Volunteer recruitment and engagement:

- Approximately 70 volunteers were onboarded this year, engaging in capacity-building training, celebration events, training facilitation, scenario-based exercises, and emergency response.
- Additionally, eleven NT Emergency Services volunteers took part in a three-day leadership program by the Australian Institute of Disaster Resilience.





Capacity Building


- **Psychological First Aid (PFA) Trainings:** 114 personnel, including staff, volunteers and stakeholders were trained in 9 PFA training sessions.
- Australasian Inter-agency Incident Management System (AIIMS): AIIMS training were conducted in Darwin and attended by 15 individuals
- **Evacuation Centre Training (ECT Level- 1)**: Four ECT training sessions were delivered this year, attended by 58 personnel from the Red Cross and emergency services stakeholders
- ➤ Evacuation Centre Management (ECM Level –2): Two ECM training sessions were delivered to 26 individuals from Red Cross and TFHC
- Rostering, Events and Deployment System (REDS) training: Six Red Cross personnel received advanced REDS training this year in Darwin.
- Planning Training Session: Training for Incident Management Team (IMT) planning function was delivered in the NT and attended by 8 Red Cross personnel.





Response

- Red Cross was activated for a total of 96 days across five events, including 21 days for the ongoing Big Rivers Monsoonal event from February 2023. The events were:
 - Barkly Complex Fires
 - Tropical Low 03U (West Daly Victoria Daly region flooding)
 - Tropical Low 07U (TC Lincoln)
 - Tropical Low 09U (TC Megan)
- We managed a 'Pop Up' Evacuation Centre at YiSSA-Short Stay Accommodation (Yilli Housing) for 19 days and the Foskey Pavilion Evacuation Centre for 11 days.
- Outreach activities included providing Psychological First Aid to 11 impacted communities and conducting phone follow-ups.
- We also supported the setup and demobilization of Marrara and Foskey's Pavilion Evacuation Centres for anticipated emergency evacuations.





Early Recovery - Outreach

- Conducted 12 different outreach visit to the disaster impacted communities:
 - Big Rivers Monsoonal Event: Finalized visits to Kalkarindji, Daguragu, and Nitjpurru.
 - Darwin River Fire: Visited two fire-affected families in Berry Springs and Darwin River.
 - Tropical Low 03U: Reached 186 individuals in Kalkarindji, Daguragu, Timber Creek, Nitjpurru, and Yarralin, providing Psychological First Aid and supporting DRFA payments from TFHC.
 - Preparedness and Outreach: Visited Nitjpurru (for preparedness), King Ash Bay, and Borroloola, delivering Psychological First Aid to 194 individuals.





Disaster Resilience – The Pillowcase Program and Emergency Redi

- ➤ The Pillowcase Program was delivered to 429 students of 8 different schools across the Northern Territory, with a focus on remote communities in Central Australia, Darwin region and the Big Rivers Region.
- Pillowcase sessions focused on emergency preparedness to the different school.
- Pillowcase sessions were delivered to the 75 students in the schools of Kalkarindji, Daguragu and Nitjpurru, communities following this wet season impacts.
- These sessions focused on post emergency, where many students expressed their feelings through artwork on their pillowcase and learned what is important to take during emergencies.
- Three emergency Redi sessions were delivered to a Nepalese community in language, Children and women from connected women's group, attended by 40 individuals.

Impact At A Glance

Our impact is measured against 5 key objectives

- Social connection
- Capacity building
- Economic participation

In the past 12 months:

- 706 women actively engaged in program activities, including First Nations women
- 42 women and their families supported in finding employment and accessing related services via CareerConnect program
- We have approximately 15% of participants from First Nations background and our goal is to increased this by 5% within next year while – providing more meaningful engagements opportunities.

In the past 3 years:

- 452 meaningful engagement opportunities were provided to participants
- 1627 people participated in capacity-building workshops and improved their skills
- 25 women and their families involved with social enterprise project - with 7 women initiating their own social enterprises as a result of program support
- 90% of participants in the Connected Women reported increased social connection and sense of belonging, mutual understanding and support
- 70% of participants reported improved job readiness
- Connected Women and Connected Families have reached a total of 8595 people









The Joy of Many Colours Multicultural Festivals in Darwin and Katherine featured 2900 participants, including 181 models, 32 cultural performances, 215 dishes from 34 nationalities, and many more meaningful and fun engagements.
