#### 1914

Australian Branch of the British Red Cross Society formed with the outbreak of World War One.



**1996** Formation of our Blood Transfusion Service.



2004

Tsunamis and earthquakes devastate Indonesia, Thailand, Sri Lanka and Maldives. Australian Red Cross jumps into action to help.



**2014** Australian Red Cross turns 100.



#### 1927

Australia recognised as a national society by International Committee of the Red Cross.



#### 1944

Australian Red Cross membership reaches around 450,000.



#### 1970s

New programs are launched to assist people dealing with poverty, homelessness and isolation.



2020

Our teams provide practical and emotional support to people across Australia and in the Asia-Pacific during the COVID-19 pandemic.



#### 2022-23

A collective of people committed to providing sustained support for people in crisis is formed: the **Red Cross 50**.

## Supporting communities in a disaster

Floods have dominated the headlines for more than a year, forcing thousands of people from their homes across Australia. And in February, when they reached remote communities of the Top End, we were there to help thanks to our supporters.

"That first Friday after the evacuations began, I was exhausted. But I remember thinking, 'There are 528 people sleeping in beds in the centre tonight. They are safe. We did that, and it's pretty special," says Annette Plowman, our Emergency Services Manager for the Northern Territory.

When floods hit the territory's Big Rivers region, hundreds of people in three small First Nations communities – Daguragu, Kalkarindji and Pigeon Hole – had to be airlifted to safety. Red Cross teams were waiting to welcome them at an evacuation centre, near Darwin. "That first night, people arrived at 11.30pm. On other days it was 2.30am. Some were wet, tired, and hungry but happy to be safe," says Annette.

"Our support is all about that human connection, sitting and listening to people. We helped comfort and reassure people, working with them to figure out what they needed. It's about self-efficacy, too. It's a great feeling watching people regain their power in a challenging, stressful situation."

Thanks to our supporters, we helped 300,000+ people before, during and after disasters and emergencies in Australia, in the 2021/22 financial year.

## Acting for humankind

🕨 East Africa

The world is changing rapidly; from floods across Australia to massive earthquakes in Türkiye and Syria, to the ongoing conflict in Ukraine. But what it looks like to act for humanity stays the same down to its core. Each day, it's people showing up for each other to offer help to whoever needs it most.

#### Protecting families in Ukraine

From the start, Red Cross teams have been on the ground in Ukraine providing food, water, shelter and hygiene items to families caught up in the conflict.

#### The hunger crisis in East Africa

A growing crisis is impacting around 20 million people in Ethiopia, Somalia, and South Sudan. Local Red Cross and Red Crescent teams have collectively reached more than **704,000** people, connecting them with health care and cash assistance, as well as water, sanitation and hygiene services.



#### Floods hit across Australia

Floods continued to dominate headlines this past year. Our teams were activated to help communities affected by floods in almost every state and territory. Over the last financial year, we supported **45,800+** people affected by floods and other disasters and emergencies.

#### Türkiye and Syria earthquakes

When massive earthquakes struck the two countries, our colleagues rushed to help. In Türkiye, this included **over 300 million** meals and **130,000+** temporary shelters. In Syria, teams reached **365,000+** people with life-saving support.

Climate change, global conflict, and catastrophic natural disasters are exacerbating an international migration crisis. Looking to the years to come – it's clear that we are about to face some of the greatest humanitarian challenges of human history.
