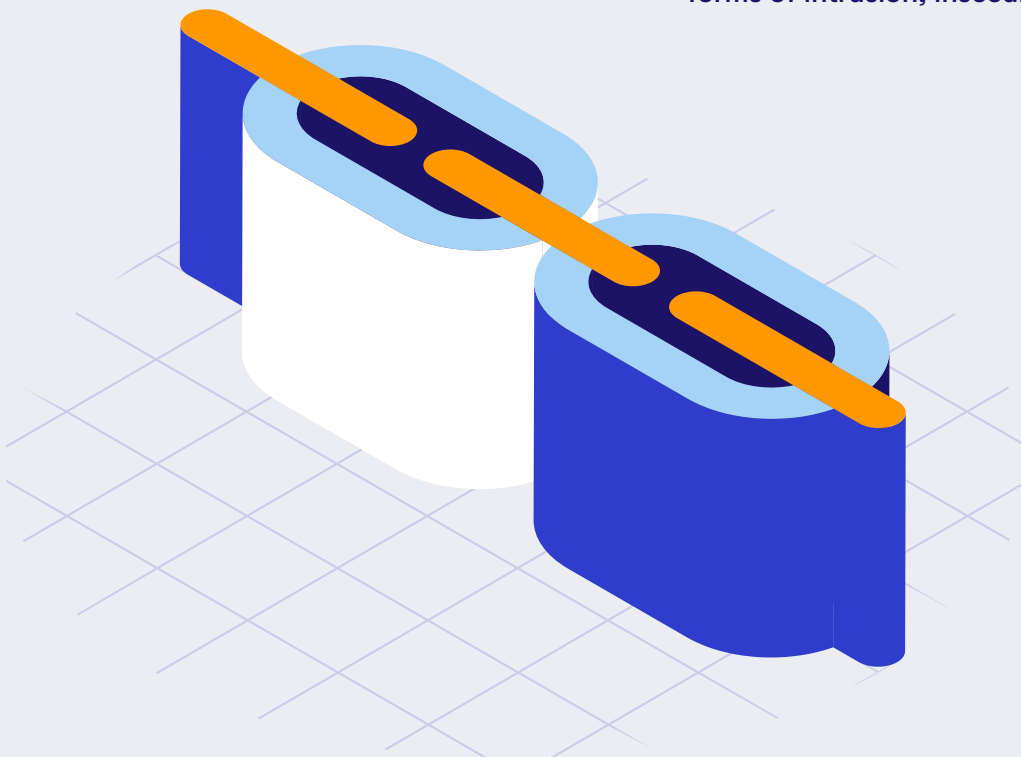
Advancing fast & far

Artificial intelligence and machine learning, digital platforms and connectivity, distributed ledger technologies and data-driven solutions are changing how the world works — how we create products and services, how we relate to each other, and how we connect with people, places and things.

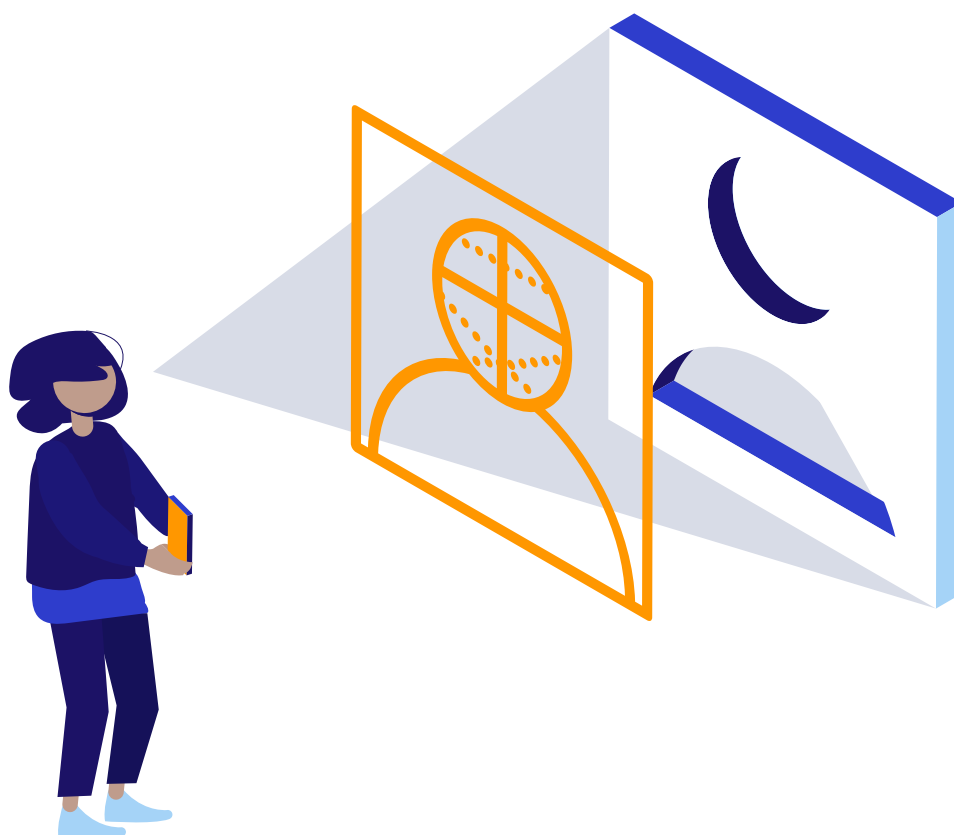


The future of vulnerability

This raises questions about the responsible, ethical and inclusive design and use of technology, and the implications this has on rights, consent, access and control.

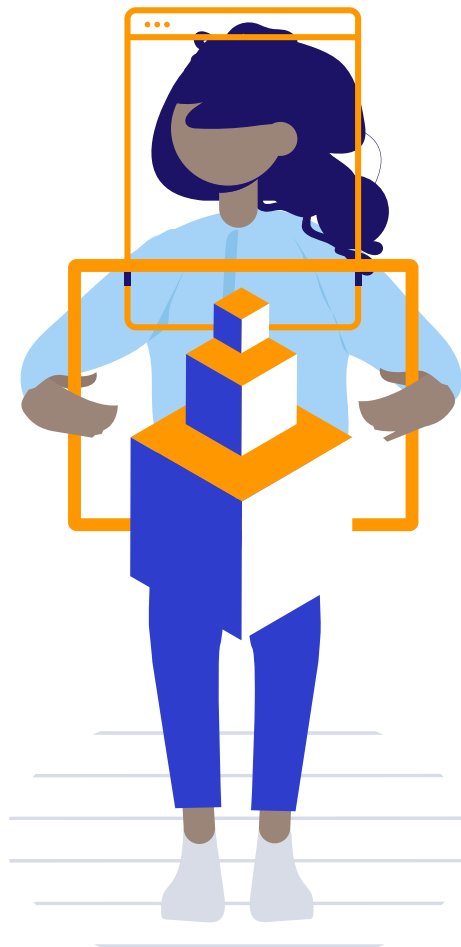

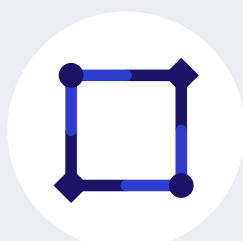

Research & Insights

Developing our own insights and evidence on the opportunities and risks new technologies present. We'll join with other institutions such as the Australian Research Council *Centre of Excellence in Automated Decision-Making and Society* as a key humanitarian industry partner.

2

The Lab

Developing solutions from concept through launch, working with a network of collaborators across sectors.

Our flagship initiative, The Identity Project is a decentralised digital credentialing platform which will give people ownership over their own identity and make it easier for them to volunteer, get a job, open a bank account or drive a car.

3

Advocacy & Influence

Contributing to research, policy and practice on the humanitarian implications of technology through policy advocacy and stakeholder engagement. Since late 2018, we have been participating in ongoing consultations on the Australian Human Rights Commission *Human Rights and Technology Project* bringing our unique humanitarian perspective to this topic, with an emphasis on ensuring technology serves humanity, especially people experiencing vulnerability.

Strategic plan

The incredible opportunities and challenges at the intersection of technology and humanity compelled Australian Red Cross to establish Humanitech in 2018. Our five-year strategy will work toward welcoming more partners to join this important initiative.

In the first year, we aim to sign up a range of cross-sectoral partners, securing funding for core activities, and co-designing our Do Lab and research agendas to ensure we're focusing on the most pressing issues.

By year five, we aim to empower an engaged and inspired cross-sector community of humanitarians, technologists and leaders who promote and apply a 'humanity first' lens to the development, analysis, use and regulation of emerging technology.
